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Jewish Home Family Kicks Off Year-Long Centennial Celebration

In 1915, a small cottage on Stevens Avenue in Jersey City was purchased to care for the burgeoning numbers of Jewish orphans in the community. As the idiom goes — “the rest is history.” True to what would become its successful model, the early organization continually morphed over subsequent years to respond to the community’s most frail and vulnerable. By the 1940’s, a significant niche was identified and the course and mission of the then Hebrew Orphans Home of Hudson County adjusted its focus on the elderly.

Next year – 2015 – marks a seminal event for our community as the Jewish Home Family celebrates its 100th Anniversary.

The Jewish Home Family is planning a wide array of activities to mark and celebrate this auspicious event. The theme for the community’s celebration of the Jewish Home Family’s Centennial celebration is “Our Next Century Starts Now.” We believe this theme not only celebrates our significant accomplishments over the



last 100 years, but also validates our community’s capacity through commitment, involvement and support, thereby providing the Jewish Home Family with the ability and charge to address the challenges of future eldercare needs. On November 3, 2014, the Jewish Home Family welcomed Carol Silver Elliott as President & CEO. Carol comes to the Jewish Home Family after serving seven years as President & CEO of Cedar Village Retirement Community in Ohio. Under her strong leadership, Cedar Village successfully launched new and expanded services and initiatives as the organization strengthened as a whole.

Carol holds a Master’s Degree in Health Care Administration, is a Licensed Nursing Home Administrator and a Certified Aging Service Professional. She currently serves as the National Chair of the Association of Jewish Aging Services (AJAS) — the association of non-profit community-based senior living homes and organizations throughout the United States and Canada, as well as on the board of Leading Age — a national eldercare organization comprised of over 6,000 nonprofit eldercare organizations. Carol has spent 35 years in the health care field, largely focused on eldercare.

In making the announcement, Eli Ungar, Chairman of the Board of the Jewish Home Family, said “for the past forty-four years the Jewish Home has benefited from the exemplary leadership of Chuck Berkowitz. When Chuck announced his intention to retire, we formed a search committee chaired by our former board chair, Ary Freilich, to identify a visionary leader capable of leading our organization forward with the same commitment



to innovation and excellence that has marked the past 44 years. I can think of no greater tribute to Chuck’s legacy, and no greater evidence of our longstanding commitment to the seniors of our community, than the hiring of Carol Silver Elliott as our CEO. As CEO of Cedar Village in Mason, Ohio, and as national board chair of the Association of Jewish Aging Services, Carol brings a wealth of experience, energy and accomplishment to our community.”

JHAL Men's Club Makes a Home Brew

Members of the Men's Club at the Jewish Home Assisted Living (JHAL) decided that they would like the opportunity to make beer as a project. So Lauren Levant, JHAL's Executive Director, contacted Love2Brew in North Brunswick, NJ which makes home brewing kits. Ron Witkowski, president of the firm, kicked off the first beer-brewing session with members of the club on August 6th. He brought all the needed items including airtight fermenting equipment, a large pot, tubing and clamping items, as well as sanitizing solution. He, with the help of some of the club members, brought the water to a boil and added the ingredients, all the while telling his audience about the brewing process as well as about some of his experiences brewing beer at his home.



After cooling the mixture, yeast was added to the container, starting the fermentation process. As this takes two weeks, the mixture was stored in a container in a closet at JHAL for that time period. Of course, club members sampled the mixture at its first stage before the meeting ended.

On August 20th, Mark Spezio, Love2Brew's COO, spoke to the club members in attendance as well as Rabbi Aryeh Meir of Teaneck, NJ, the group's leader. JHAL's Men's Club has 10 to 15 members and meets once a week. Rabbi Meir said that the club has helped "develop lines of communication between the men. They get to know one another in a group setting."

Mark pointed out that it's important to store the beer at 65 to 70 degrees. Both Mark and Ron emphasized the necessity of sanitizing the equipment because an infection can get into the mixture and the beer won't taste right. After sampling the mixture, Mark noted that the yeast had done its job. In order to keep oxygenation at a minimum, he used a siphon to transfer the beer to another bucket. He then prepared the sanitizer, noting that in the beer industry, sanitizer is made with a yeast ingredient which kills bacteria and is safe to use.

The group then cleaned the amber bottles and caps with sanitizer. They filled 48 bottles with the not-yet-carbonated beer and capped them, again tasting a little of their brew before storing the bottles and allowing the carbonation process to take place – another two-week process.

On September 3rd, the bottles were opened and members in attendance, along with Rabbi Meir, had a tasting. Dubbed "He-Brew," everyone agreed... "it tastes like beer!"
